

Recoveron Partners with Plymouth FD to Help House Fire Victims

We protect our home and families with smoke detectors, practice fire drills and teach our kids to stop, drop and roll if their clothes catch on fire. But what happens once all flames are out? A house fire can be one of the most devastating and traumatic experiences a family ever faces. To help ease the burden on displaced families, Recoveron, a full service restoration firm in Plymouth, is providing the Plymouth Fire Department with care packages that contain basic necessities for men, women and children.

Depending on the extent of damage, families can be displaced indefinitely until they find a new place to live. “Most families that suffer any type of home fire are displaced from their homes at least 24 hours,” said Ron Nicolaus, Plymouth Volunteer Fire Department Chief. “For safety reasons, we do not allow families to enter their homes until the entire structure is completely secure, which many times leads to families leaving the scene with no personal belongings.”

That’s where Recoveron comes in. Recoveron is providing bags filled with basic necessities to the Plymouth Fire Department to help those displaced by fire. “We often work with families who have experienced a house fire and see the emotional distress they go through,” said Andy Kaye, Recoveron President. “We hope that our assistance helps these families cope with the loss they have just experienced by providing them with the basic necessities to spend time away from home.”

The bags provided by Recoveron consist of basic personal hygiene and other items, including:

- Toothbrushes, toothpaste and floss
- Shampoo, soap and a comb
- Men’s and women’s deodorant
- Shaving cream and men’s and women’s disposable razors
- Antibacterial moist wipes and tissues
- First aid kit and Tylenol®
- Playing cards, a coloring book and crayons

Since Recoveron began partnering with the Plymouth Fire Department, a number of bags have been given out to fire victims in the Plymouth area. “As a volunteer fire department, we really rely on support from our communities,” said Nicolaus. “Programs like this really make a difference in the service we provide.”
